

# **Year 1 Spring 1 Curriculum Overview**

# **Topic Overview**

Roars, paws and claws is our topic in Year 1 this half term. We will be making links with our English text drivers, Geography and Science. The children will have the opportunity to explore our school grounds, whilst making links with hot and cold places around the world and the animals that live there.

### **Core Subjects**

**English**: Roars, paws and claws. The children will develop their writing skills through different text types (instructions, labels, advertisements, recounts and letters).

**Maths:** The children will continue to develop their understanding of number and place value; applying this to addition & subtraction, multiplication & division, fractions and measurement.

**Science:** Animals, including humans. The children will explore the animals in our school grounds and local areas whilst comparing to those animals that live in hot and cold places around the world.

**Computing:** Using iPads to photograph animals and plants in our school grounds and look at the use of editing tools to change these.

**RE**: People Jesus met (changes)

P4C/ PSHE: Changes

PE: Invasion skills and games/ Gymnastics (Balance)

Geography: Looking at hot and cold places around the world

**DT:** Leavers and sliders (moving animals)
